FROM THE CEO

FAN

Welcome to the FAN Autumn newsletter. I am writing this the third week back from extended leave, I therefore draw your attention to the program updates within the newsletter for up to date information on Family Access Network, programs and activities. David MacKenzie has also prepared an article on behalf of the Board on the National Youth Commission.

The 12 month funding extension the National Partnership Agreement on Homelessness (NPAH) translates to \$117 million for 180 critically important services means that 80,000 Australians experiencing crisis related to homelessness and family violence will be supported. Originally a three-year agreement between the Commonwealth and State/ Territory governments, The NPAH has been 'renewed' annually for the last three years. Annual funding severely impacts on services' ability to operate efficiently and to forward plan. The practise of announcing renewals just months before expiration of the previous iteration of NPAH creates much uncertainty negatively impacts on those experiencing, or at risk of homelessness. FAN's partnership with Eastern Health in the delivery of the Homeless Youth Dual Diagnosis Initiative (HYDDI) is one of the funded programs within NPAH.

It is a rare community based not for profit organisation that does not engage in multiple activities to ensure financial capacity to deliver a broad range of client centred, flexible and responsive programs. FAN receives a combination of federal, state and local government funding, as well as philanthropic grants, and support from service clubs and individual donors. In 2016 a band fundraiser was held, drawing on the musical talents of two members of the Board, the Chair David Burlew and Treasurer Brett Philipp and their respective bands, so we are repeating it on 20 May, at the Knox Club. We have also received a very generous donation of an original painting from Dagmar Cyrulla depicting a mother and child, which will be raffled with all proceeds going to FAN's programs. For more information about both events please read further in the newsletter.

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FROM THE BOARD

The NYC is Coming??

What can the Australian community do when our political leaders seem incapable of working out the way forward. What should we do when issues affecting all young Australians are confounded by partisan discord with little in the way of constructive policy being proposed. The one issue that appears every day in the media and is the subject of concern amongst young people and families everywhere is the transition of young Australians from school/education to employment. Is our education system failing to prepare young people for life and work? Why do so many of our most disadvantaged young people leave school early? What prospects do young people have for sustainable livelihoods in the 21st Century global economy? What should Australia be doing to secure the future of its next generation? The most disadvantaged and vulnerable young people have the greatest difficulty in making successful transitions to sustainable livelihoods, however, the issues of transition have become the concern of much wider sections of the Australian community. Many young graduates struggle to gain employment in their field and the uncertainties of transition seem to be spreading.

In 2007-08, the first *National Youth Commission into Youth Homelessness* (NYC) was launched as a 'citizen's royal commission' to work up an agenda for action and positive solutions drawn from the input of the Australian community on the issue of youth homelessness. It was modelled on the landmark Burdekin Human Rights and Equal Opportunity Commission inquiry of 1989. Accompanying the Inquiry was the making of the feature documentary The Oasis. The launch of the 400-page NYC report in the first week of April was accompanied by a showing of The Oasis in prime time on ABC-TV followed by a panel discussion chaired by Tony Jones (the first Q&A). The first NYC hugely shaped the Federal Government White Paper on Homelessness, *The Road Home*, released in December 2008.

A decade later, the *National Youth Commission into Youth Employment and Transitions*, due to begin mid-2017, is a proven strategy for bringing together evidence and experience from people in the community, from young people themselves, from their families and schools and from those who are professionally dedicated to supporting our young people. Its power derives from the

combination of a rigorous sophisticated national inquiry, with a broadcast documentary on the issues, together with constant social media and the resources for PR and community campaigning – the whole is greater than the sum of the parts.

The dimensions of the complex problems of education and youth employment, along with the associated difficult issues of the transition to a sustainable livelihood, will be explored in a deeply solutions-focused way – what can we do – what needs to be done – what reforms to systems do we need to consider. Wicked problems and the deteriorating prospects for so many young Australians deserve much better than what is currently being offered. Concerns about these issues have been widely expressed by Australians across the political divide - prominent business leaders,

educationists, youth workers and community organisations, local government elected representatives and staff and university academics.

Individuals and organisations are invited to come forward and support the forthcoming NYC and/or contribute testimony and ideas. Get involved!

But wait. . . . there's more!




We are both delighted and grateful for her donation. We will be putting this stunning example of fine art as the sole prize for an upcoming raffle.

You never know who might be interested in giving back to their community so it's worth spreading the word; we would like to bring to your attention the current Volunteer Vacancies;

CHILD PLAY SUPERVISORS

Child Play Supervisors engage in a range of child friendly, age appropriate activities with children while their parents attend appointments, meet with Support Workers or participate in workshops attached to various FAN Programs.

VOLUNTEER MENTORS

The aim of the Volunteer Mentor is to act as a neutral and consistent role model and provide friendship and support (on a one to one basis) to a young person between the ages of 15-25 years. Mentors and young people meet on a weekly basis – at a time and place that is mutually agreed - and engage in a range of low cost activities that build positive adult relationships and community connection.

LEAD TENANT

FAN is currently seeking to engage a Lead Tenant aged 21 or over to assist us to support three young people in a shared living house. This is a voluntary live-in position that involves a 12 month commitment in exchange for rent free accommodation. You will have your own bedroom and bathroom.

The Lead Tenant is required, in liaison with the agency, to ensure that house rules are maintained. The Lead Tenant is not a professional support role but rather a positive role model living in a shared property. The Lead Tenant would pay for their own food and cleaning products, utility bills are approx. \$27.00 per week.

Ideally suited to someone who is interested in, or actively studying, in the Human Services Field. This position offers ongoing training and support. The purpose of the position is to act as a role model for young people to help them to live and share in independent accommodation.

Homelessness Support Services

The Homelessness Support Services (HSS) team have been enjoying welcoming and getting to know a gamut of new young people over the past few months. In saying that, the team is (sadly) saying goodbye to a number of young people who have (happily) accepted positions at Universities – even interstate! Congratulations to them and all the best for their studies!

The HSS team were recently lucky enough to be granted much needed funding from the

Sydney Myer Fund. This funding will be important in assisting young people to move into their long-term housing options, particularly those that are unable to be assisted by the Private Rental Brokerage Program and Housing Establishment Fund funding.

The Same Sex Attracted, Transgender and Intersex (SSATI) properties are currently full, so the waiting list is well and truly back up and running.

Creating Connections Private Rental Brokerage Program

With the Creating Connections Private Rental Brokerage Program (PRBP) coming up to its 10th year it is important to reflect on the incredible achievements of this program and its significance in the homelessness service system and the young people which it assists. From 2007 the PRBP has supported a total of 649 young people and 130 children almost doubling its funded targets. The ranges of services offered to young people through the PRBP include skills based education around the private rental market and flexible brokerage packages. These supports have proved crucial in assisting young people with accessing and maintaining housing in the private rental market and ending the cycle of youth homelessness. Our statistics show that approximately 80% of young people who are supported by the PRBP and access private rental housing continue to maintain their rental property one year after being supported by

the PRBP and not re-entering the homelessness service system. With the high number of young people the program supports and its success in assisting these young people in breaking their experience of homelessness the private rental program plays a crucial and significant role in the homelessness service sector. My hope is that the PRBP continues to exist well into the future and continues to positively impact young people.
